A Brief History of Parish

The first residents of our community were the Rev. Gamaliel Barnes and his son-inlaw, Stephen D. Morse. They settled at the present location of Pleasant Lawn Cemetery in 1803, where they built the first log house and barn, and later a frame house.

Born in 1757 in Connecticut, Barnes was a Revolutionary War veteran. He was a tanner and shoemaker before he became a Baptist preacher. He ministered throughout much of central and eastern Oswego County for 50 years. He died at age 96.

Originally part of the Town of Mexico, the Town of Parish was incorporated in 1828. Parish was named for David Parish, who owned the largest share of the town's land.

The community has always supported a number of churches. The Methodists established a congregation in 1869, the Presbyterians in 1893, the current St. Anne's Catholic Church in 1952, and the Faith Church of the Nazarene in 1980. Schools have also been important. The first frame school was built in 1814. In the early 1950s, the communities of Altmar, Parish and Williamstown consolidated their schools to form the Altmar-Parish-Williamstown Central School District.

The area is blessed with abundant natural resources. Recreational facilities include the William E. Merrill Community Park, Happy Valley Wildlife Management Area, East Coast Resorts, and Harmony Riders Association Campground.

Parish is the home of a number of family businesses that span several generations. They include the Harter family's Harter Funeral Homes, formed in 1836; the Miller family's F.E. Miller & Sons Lumber, established in 1897; and the Fuller family, which founded State Bank of Parish in 1919, Parish Oil Company, 1926, and the current Ascent Technological Group. The Oswego County Mutual Insurance Company has been in business in Parish since 1878.

Among our famous citizens are Nathan Petrie and Samuel Mills, who donated to the community the Veterans Memorial Park, the chapel at Pleasant Lawn Cemetery, the public library, the town clock, and the gymnasium. Other prominent residents were Edward C. Quinn, who served as President of the Chrysler Corp., and Hadwen C. Fuller Sr., who served as a member of Congress.

The people of Parish today are very thankful for the men and women who have so faithfully over the years kept our town prosperous, successful, and active. Those who built and maintained our roads and streets. Those that cleared and farmed our land. Those that built our homes and established our businesses. Those who organized and served in local government, taught in our schools, preached in our community, fought our fires, volunteered in civic organizations, and who courageously and faithfully served our nation in times of war and peace. We thank them all.
